

## **Moving Your Collaborative Forward**

Indiana Child Welfare Leadership and Community Mental Health Centers Joint Meeting
Bloomington, IN
September 24, 2016

This document provides concrete activities to assist in furthering and building your collaborative. It can be used as part of the Roundtable Discussions. It is ideal for team members to be seated by region so that region-specific workplans can be developed.

Three activities based on the *Three Rs of Collaboration* are provided for each of the regionally based workgroups. A state level workplan can be developed from each of the regionally based workplans.

- I. Relationships: Developing Your Governance Structure. Developing a Governance Structure is critical to the success of collaborative practice and policy.
- II. Results: Identifying Data for Effective Planning. Data collection is an important part of the process for identifying families in need of services and fulfilling that need. Various systems must share different data elements to improve outcomes for families affected by substance use.
- III. Resources: Identifying and Implementing Key Strategies. Identifying concrete strategies after an assessment of each partners' values and prioritization of identified issues are necessary for the development and implementation of a region-specific workplan.

Instructions are provided for each activity in the following. Approximately 20 minutes will be required for each activity, with about 15 minutes each to prepare the workgroups and for a report-out by each group.



I) **Developing your Governance Structure**: Developing a Governance Structure is critical to the success of collaborative practice and policy. Identifying ongoing meetings are necessary to ensure implementation.

Team members are to identify the appropriate individual or individuals to fulfill the below described roles. Assignment should be based on the function of each role and each individual's level of oversight and key areas of responsibility.

II) Identifying Data for Effective Planning: Data collection is an important part of the process for identifying families in need of services and fulfilling that need. Various systems must share different data elements to improve outcomes for families affected by substance use.

Team members are to identify the data source (e.g. which system and point person) for the below listed data elements. In your group discuss where these data elements can come from and what systems need to collaborate data sharing.

**III) Identifying and Implementing Key Strategies**: The following table summarizes *Seven Common Ingredients and Strategies of Collaborative Practice*. Team members are to prioritize collaborative strategies and issues for implementation.

Early Access to Assessment and Treatment Services	Potential Next Step:  Develop and implement training materials on substance use treatment and recovery.  Explore protocols related to how parents are referred to and engaged in to treatment.  Explore whether data systems capture treatment referral, access and engagement.
Increased Management of Recovery Services and Compliance	Potential Next Step:  • Explore program strategies such as Substance Abuse Specialists/ Recovery Support Specialists, and intensive case management.



Improved Family-Centered Services and Repair of Parent-Child Relationships	Potential Next Step:  • Explore what family-centered services are available. Does a range (e.g. parent-child attachment, parenting skills, etc.) of parent-child focused services exist?
Increased Judicial and Administrative Oversight	Potential Next Step:  Explore strategies such as more frequent and informal administrative hearings and Team Decision Making opportunities.  Potential Next Step:  Explore strategies such as more frequent and informal administrative hearings and Team Decision Making opportunities.



Responses to Participant Behavior (Contingency Management)	Potential Next Step:  • Explore protocols related to monitoring of case and treatment plans.
Collaborative Approach Across Service Systems and Courts	Potential Next Step:  Explore what MOUs, communication protocols, and data sharing agreements, etc. exist to facilitate communication between the systems and/or are necessary to develop and implement.
