→ Ensure services meet the needs of children and families, while maintaining the agency's fiscal responsibility.




# Milliman Home and Community-Based Rate Review

- → Project began in September 2022
- → Lots of provider interaction including provider-led steering committee and thorough survey
- → Report with recommended rates is available on-line (<u>https://www.milliman.com/en/services/dcs-rate-review</u>)
- → Most services recommended for rate increases. DCS accepted the recommendations
- $\rightarrow$  Rates updated effective 7/1/2023



# Child Services Workforce Stabilization Fund

- → \$30M of state funds (no federal dollars support this)
- → Competitive application process to ensure dollars go where they are most needed
- → Grant information can be found here: <u>https://www.in.gov/dcs/current-requests-for-proposals/</u>
- $\rightarrow$  Formal questions can be submitted until 8/4/2023
- $\rightarrow$  Deadline to respond: 8/18/2023



# **CMHC Contract**

- → Numerous requests were made related to DCS training requirements. All were accepted.
- → Contracts effective 7/1/2023 though 6/30/2027



#### **Update on Family Pres-What is it?**

Per-diem based reimbursement model (\$113.47/day minimum)

Evidence-based interventions and concrete supports to prevent removals

Focus on child safety with in-home services

Launched statewide June 1, 2020



Program was recommended for a rate decrease, but DCS declined that recommendation.

#### **Update on Family Pres' impact:**



Indiana Family Preservation Services (INFPS) launched statewide 6/1/2020.



21,707 kids, 10,801 families served.\*



10.05% repeat maltreatment rate (2,182 kids).



9.83% removal rate (2,134 kids).

\*All statistics as of 7/26/23. Data tracked for 1 year post case closure.



# Two goals:

- Keep families together
- Keep kids safe

#### **Big picture:**



Kids in out-of-home care: 5/31/2020: 12,956 6/30/2023: 8,604 (Down 33.6%)



Absence of Repeat Maltreatment: 5/31/2020: 93.60% 6/30/2023: 95.20%



#### More data:



Kids in out-of-home care: 10/31/2017: 17,286 6/30/2023: 8,604 (Down 50.2%)



Absence of Repeat Maltreatment: 10/1/2017: 92.93% (federal goal is 94.6%) 6/30/2023: 95.20%\*

\*DCS went 121 months without hitting federal target (12/2011 – 2/2022). We've hit it every month since (17 months in a row).










# **DCS Goal: Reduce Disparities**

# **After INFPS**

→ Speed of contact with families:
 54% of INFPS cases have their first
 face-to-face contact within 3 days of
 referral. Average is around 5 days.

→ Comparison group: Average was 19 days



# **After INFPS**

- → Development of protective factors as a focus of service: www.childwelfare.gov/pubpdfs/ protective factors.pdf.
- → Assurance of child safety:
  Weekly, in-home face-to-face contacts.



# **After INFPS**

 → Evidence-based interventions:
 Around 92% of cases have evidencebased interventions as well as much quicker access to service.

 $\rightarrow$  **Provider-level data:** 

Much more data we can use to drive improvements.

→ Formal evaluation published in <u>Journal</u>
 <u>of Child Abuse and Neglect</u>



# **CMHC vs. Non-CMHC with INFPS**





They have served 5,332 children (21,707 total children have been served statewide), so 24.6% of cases have been served by CMHCs.

13 CMHCs have served more than 100 kids, with the max being 1,139 kids served. (35 non-CMHC providers have served more than 100 kids, largest having served 4,406.)



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CMHC Repeat Maltreatment = 9.84% (state avg. 10.05%) CMHC Removal = 9.92% (state avg. 9.83%)

# **Reducing Residential Placements**

- → FFPSA puts much more oversight on states when youth are placed in congregate care (institutional) settings.
- → Only youth who have specific treatment needs that can only be addressed in residential treatment, as confirmed by a qualified and objective individual using an evidence-based tool, should be in residential care.
- → Only high-quality "QRTPs" are eligible for IV-E, and youth should not be in these programs longer than necessary.
- $\rightarrow$  This has been an important goal of the Department as well.
  - April 2017: 1,024 (6.1%) kids in residential.
  - July 2023: 475 (5.5%) kids in residential.

# IMD and QRTP

- → DCS has worked closely with FSSA and OMPP on the intersection of IMD and QRTP brought on by the passage of FFPSA.
- → The state is committed to continuity of care for children and continuity of operations for our providers.
- → Facility evaluations by OMPP are still in process.
