Behavioral Health Workgroup Recommendations

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Indiana's Plan for Behavioral Health Under HEA 1359-2022



Develop criteria for the use of diagnostic assessments as described in Ind. Code 31-37-19-11.7 (permits use of telehealth services as a juvenile court alternative to traditional diagnostic assessments).



Develop a statewide plan to address the provision of broader behavioral health services for youth in the juvenile justice system



Comprehensive Plan and Policy for Court-Ordered Diagnostic Assessments

Develop and adopt a comprehensive plan and policy.

Track data related to court ordered pre-dispositional psychological assessments.

Documentation of utilizing least restrictive setting to conduct an assessment



Considerations for Referral to DOC-DYS for Diagnostic Assessment



Consider key questions before making a referral to DOC-DYS for a diagnostic assessment

Does the youth have a current mental health diagnosis? Is a diagnostic assessment already available? To what extent does the mental health appear to be connected to delinquent behavior?



Emphasize evidence-based, trauma-informed, culturally appropriate evaluations

Inter-agency evaluations must be evidence-based and trauma-informed, as well as culturally appropriate and responsive to the needs of the community.



Acceptable timeframe for decision-making

Protocols should emphasize an acceptable timeframe to use these evaluations to inform decision-making.



Annual Statewide Assessment by Oversight Body



Mandate an annual assessment by an oversight body

To analyze current data and trends, with a special focus on rural areas



Provide targeted technical assistance

To support local youth justice systems and practitioners in providing high-quality evaluations



Inform recommendations for policy and practice changes

To improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the youth justice system



Provide local counties with guidelines

To provide a clear, uniform plan for data collection and presentation



Partnering with DCS to Expand Availability of Diagnostic Assessments



Expand DCS availability

Provide additional assessments in the community, utilizing telehealth instead of sending youth to DOC



Incentivize providers

Engage with and incentivize providers to complete assessments in a timely manner



Local agreements

Create local service agreements with professionals and/or local agencies to administer evaluations



Behavioral health grants

Utilize behavioral health grants to coordinate and expand available resources



Utilizing Telehealth



Utilize Telehealth Options

to alleviate the need for youth to be Sent to DOC-DYS



Secure Videoconferencing

Store and Forward Technology, or Remote Patient Monitoring Technology



Medicaid Reimbursement

for one unit of psychiatric diagnostic evaluation interview examination per member and provider in a rolling 12-month period



Barriers to Consider

Provide a private space in probation offices or a detention center, Affordable Connectivity Program, Behavioral Health Grants, Statewide Funding for Broadband



Implementing a Multidisciplinary Team Model for Youth with High Acuity



Create a multidisciplinary team

Composed of multiple agencies and stakeholders to address the complex needs of youth presenting with high acuity needs.



Develop a formalized membership, escalation process, and voting procedures

To oversee the process of locating services and/or placements.



Create a resource guide

To ensure all resources have been utilized and exhausted, prior to the case being referred to the state multidisciplinary team.



Expand Existing Programming to Include Evidence Based Treatment



Multi-Systemic Therapy (MST)

Therapists can work in the home, school, and community and on-call 24/7 to provide caregivers with the tools they need to transform the lives of the youth served.



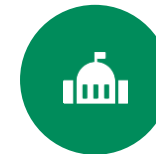
Mentoring Programs

Create robust and fully-funded mentoring programs or support those already in existence that are aligned with best practices for youth mentoring.



Family Mentoring

Based on Family Support Providers (FSP or Navigators; FSPs are individuals who work with families in the juvenile justice system.



Credible Messengers

A transformational process where individuals from similar back groups, especially individuals who were themselves system-involved, engage youth in structured and intentional relationships.

Implement Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHCS)



Improve Mental Health Literacy



Increase Workforce



Data Sharing Program



Youth & Family Advisory Group



Better system coordination between DOC, schools, and others who have provided services to youth



Increase efforts for parental engagement before and after system involvement



Focus on earlier interventions and use of diversion to minimize system involvement



Enhance partnerships with community partners



Continue to expand access to providers in rural areas to decrease access times to mental health treatment
