

## CCBHCs in: Indiana

**Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHCs)** provide comprehensive mental health and substance use care in communities across the country. They provide, at a minimum, a set of nine core outpatient services that adhere to federally defined standards, including 24/7 mobile crisis response, specialized care for veterans, and structured collaboration with community partners to ease the pressure on emergency departments and law enforcement. CCBHCs are required to serve anyone with a need for mental health and substance use care, regardless of age, ability to pay or place of residence. There are two primary types of CCBHCs:

- **Medicaid CCBHCs** operate under either the CCBHC Medicaid Demonstration or a State Plan Amendment and receive reimbursement through a prospective payment system (PPS).
- **Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Federal Grantees** receive grant funding from SAMHSA to establish or expand the CCBHC model.

### State Impact: 13 Total CCBHCs (8 Medicaid CCBHCs and 5 SAMHSA Federal Grantees)

**Expanding Timely Access to Care:** The **12** Indiana CCBHCs that responded to the survey collectively serve more than **119,013** individuals, representing a **31%** increase in the number of individuals served since becoming a CCBHC. Of these, the seven **Medicaid CCBHCs** collectively serve **73,744** individuals, accounting for approximately **62%** of all individuals served by responding Indiana CCBHCs. The 5 **SAMHSA Federal grantees** collectively serve **45,269** individuals, representing the remaining **38%** of the total population served.



Since becoming a CCBHC, **58%** of Indiana CCBHCs reported increases in the number of children and youth served, **42%** reported increases in uninsured individuals served, and **17%** reported increases in individuals with mental health or substance use needs who had not previously received behavioral health care. These trends varied between Medicaid CCBHCs and SAMHSA Federal grantees.

Among **Medicaid CCBHCs**, **43%** reported increases in children and youth served, **29%** reported increases in uninsured individuals served, and **29%** reported increases in individuals who had not previously received behavioral health care.

Among **SAMHSA Federal grantees**, 80% reported increases in children and youth served, while 60% reported increases in uninsured individuals served.

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**Improving Access to SUD Care:** **42%** of Indiana CCBHCs reported an increase in the number of individuals receiving medication for opioid use disorder (MOUD). The findings were largely consistent across CCBHC types, with **43%** of Medicaid CCBHCs and **40%** of SAMHSA Federal grantees reporting increases in the number of individuals engaged in MOUD treatment.



**Serving Children, Youth, and Families:** All Indiana CCBHCs (**100%**) provide behavioral health services on-site in one or more schools, child care settings, or other youth-serving locations. This includes **100% of both Medicaid CCBHCs and SAMHSA Federal grantees**, demonstrating a statewide commitment to bringing behavioral health services directly to children and youth where they learn and receive support.



**Serving Justice-Involved Individuals:** All Indiana CCBHCs (**100%**) reported engaging in one or more innovative partnerships with criminal justice agencies. The most common activities included providing behavioral health services in partnership with courts (**100%**), training law enforcement officers in Mental Health First Aid or other behavioral health awareness programs (**83%**), and increasing outreach to people with criminal legal system involvement (**75%**).

Among **Medicaid CCBHCs**, **100%** partnered with courts, **86%** increased outreach to people with criminal legal system involvement, and **83%** provided Mental Health First Aid or other behavioral health awareness training for law enforcement.

Similarly, **100%** of **SAMHSA Federal grantees** partnered with courts, while **80%** increased outreach to people with criminal legal system involvement and **80%** trained law enforcement officers in Mental Health First Aid or other behavioral health awareness programs.



**Serving Older Adults:** Since becoming a CCBHC, **33%** of Indiana CCBHCs reported an increase in the number of Medicare-only beneficiaries served. This increase was reported by **43%** of Medicaid CCBHCs, compared with **20%** of SAMHSA Federal grantees.



**Addressing Homelessness through Partnerships:** CCBHCs play an important role in connecting individuals to housing resources and reducing homelessness. Among Indiana CCBHCs, **58%** reported improved connections to housing assistance programs for their clients, **42%** reported increased access to stable housing, and **33%** reported reductions in homelessness among the individuals they serve.

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Among **Medicaid CCBHCs**, **57%** reported improved connections to housing assistance programs, **43%** reported increased access to stable housing, and **29%** reported reductions in homelessness among their clients.

Among **SAMHSA Federal grantees**, **60%** reported improved connections to housing assistance programs, **40%** reported increased access to stable housing, and **40%** reported reductions in homelessness among their clients.



**Investing in Workforce:** Medicaid CCBHCs in Indiana are addressing workforce shortages by strengthening recruitment and retention strategies, expanding staffing capacity, and supporting workforce development.
